# Acting Break-Out Session – CATR Re-Imagining the Future Learn-In March 18<sup>th</sup>

#### 1. Introductions

- 5 participants plus 2 facilitators
  - o Sherry a recent student studying actor as source of reconciliation
  - o Sasha Centre for Indigenous Theatre, PhD, climate performance interest
  - Kim University of Guelph, Theatre Studies; direct students who do performance creation, taught a course about land outdoors
  - Marti Second year PhD at University of Kansas, from Iran, teaching acting and feeling eco-guilty particularly with all the paper waste in Department
  - o Julia from CGA

## 2. Examples Shared

- Zhuohao talked about sharing own ecological traditions, for example how water is viewed and represented
- Kim's class outdoors started by selecting a tree or plant, then getting consent from it to
  work together; audio walks, devising in space for site specific performance; students
  really enjoyed working outside and when they returned in another class to the outdoors
  they were so glad to be back outside
- Hope shared her use of "Lighting the Way" anthology from Climate Change Theatre
   Action for an acting class, bringing in Kendra Fanconi as a guest speaker, researching the
   material, and integrating sustainability by only using re-purposed props and costumes;
   however there was resistance from one older student who saw environmentalists as
   hippies and thought there were more important issues to address; he was cast as the
   naysayer and was therefore able to channel his views but also played other characters so
   that by the end he'd opened up his viewpoint

#### 3. Syllabi Components

- Values/Principles:
  - include a climate acknowledgement as well as a land acknowledgement, sustainability statement, commitment
  - Need to connect with community outside of the campus
  - o Room agreements with ecological frameworks and then how to do it
  - Included ecological traditions from other cultural backgrounds
- Content/Materials request for plays to use:
  - 100 Plays to Save the World
  - What We Do For Love
  - Climate Change Theatre Action books <u>Books Climate Change Theatre Action</u>

#### Course Activities

- Work outside with Elders
- Land tour with Indigenous organization to start off a class and situation students in the location

 Work outdoors, what do you see and what stories can you tell from this; ten minutes to record observations, writing and embodiment

### 4. Discussion

- Key is integration
- Resistance = how to counter or navigate this in students
- Also resistance as a cultural practice
- Integrate sustainability even if not topic of class and with other departments supporting the department productions, i.e. design and productions classes/faculty/students
- Imagination in performance
